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FAIR TRADE



The Following Dialogue was used in the Sunday Service 24th February...

With Fairtrade Fortnight almost upon us, we would like to share a few words about Justice matters...

About 3 years ago the then called Mission Group felt rather defeated; we felt inadequate and that our concerns weren't reaching the congregation. There was even talk that our actions were development aid and not necessarily the Gospel.

I'm not sure either that anyone was listening to what was being said. Don't you think people were a bit tuned off with a group banging on about where to shop and what to buy! Bit a bossy don't you think?!

That may well have been the case, but eventually, we invited Sue McKenzie to one of our meetings and we off-loaded our burden onto her. And she listened.

Well, Sue was a listening kind of Minister, but did she have any suggestions for the Group?

Yes, she had. There was no pat on our backs or the suggestion of drastic change in what we did. After pondering our dilemma, Sue simply said: "You might not live up to your own expectations, but you must continue be a voice for justice in this congregation."

Sounds like good advice to me, but what did you do with her wise words?

Well, Sue's advice prompted us to change the name of the team and now we are The Voice for Justice Group.

So, what changes have taken place besides tinkering about with a name change?

It is our renewed desire to be that voice, speaking out but also not wishing to appear like the Fair Trade police checking out how many Fair Trade labels are in your kitchen cupboards! Knowing that when people hear the justice message, whether comfortable or not with it, the responsibility has been passed on to them, with the Justice Group relieved of unrealistic expectations.

So what you are saying is: the Voice for Justice Team is only a mouth piece. Whether the message is a spoken word, written texts especially the Bible, or displays and conversations; it is the listener that has to make a choice between, burying our head in the sand, dismiss the message because it's too difficult to think about or take notice and try and work out with God what it means in our everyday lives. LATEST EXTEND PROJECT WORK

Many of you will know, and will have seen the photographs in last month's magazine, that the



Chattabox Holiday Club took place at Martinshaw School on the Monday and Tuesday of February half term. Around 40 children attended each day being "Guardians of Ancora". Ancora is a place where the stories of The Light have been lost for a long time, though they are slowly being discovered and re-told so that everyone can know about The Light and bring it back to the city.

This year the themes were Christmas and Easter; the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus. Each day there were clues to the stories (and to the later craft activities) and once the clues had been found "Antiqua" would come out and tell us the latest story to be discovered. On the first day we had the angel visiting Mary and then Joseph, the journey to Bethlehem and the special visitors to the Baby Jesus. On the second day, the morning was spent looking at the death of Jesus on the cross and then in the afternoon there was the wonderful story of Jesus being alive again.

A great time was had by all. We sang songs, played games and had craft sessions making angels, sheep, stained glass crosses and pennants. Thanks to all the group leaders and junior leaders, Linda, Chris and Laurence for aiding the crafts. Thanks to Lynda Hawkes for being Antiqua; for help in the kitchen from Martin and Val; on the tech side from Dave Smith and to all those who helped set up beforehand and take down afterwards.

Those of you who attend or help out at Tasters on a Saturday morning at the URC will have noticed a slight change in the "play" area. We no longer have the Bouncy Castle nearly every week, but have been trialling having the Bouncy Castle on the 2nd, 4th and 5th Saturdays and craft sessions on the 1st and 3rd Saturdays. The craft ideas usually have a theme related to a Bible Story or Christian theme (fair-trade was one theme recently) and at around

11:40, depending on how busy everyone is with their crafts, we tell the story and play a game. The trial will go on until Easter when it will be reviewed. If you have any particular views, I'd love to hear from you. If you have any other suggestions about how we can develop the "play" side of Tasters, I'd love to hear that too. We are there to be a Christian presence, to relate to the children who attend and their families and to compliment other, more Christian activities in the village that take place at the churches and in school assemblies.

Talking about developing our work, I am currently looking at the next steps in our young families work and have been talking to parents about what else we may be able to provide for young families in Groby. Some ideas have already come forward such as an after-school club, a place where parents can regularly weigh their young babies and a "Toddler Praise" session. If you have any thoughts, please come and talk to me when I am in church or email me – details below. I'd especially love to hear from you if you feel that you would be able to help at a session or two every now and again.

On a final note, we are really pleased that we have now re-started the Christian Union in Brookvale. It runs on a Friday lunchtime in classroom G29 and is led by 2 of our junior Rock Solid Leaders, Ruth and Becca. At the moment we have around 10 young people who attend most weeks, including some friends from Rock Solid.

OPEN THE BOOK

After a few weeks break we are now preparing for our big Easter Open the Book production when we are presenting 'Peter's Saddest Day' followed by 'Peter's Happiest Day'.

TEST OF FAITH, TRUST AND CERTAINTY

This is something I shared with elders at our meeting the day after our preach with a view weekend – I include this in Contact as encouragement for all of us.

Whilst we were grappling with the uncertainty of the minister leading the two services on the Sunday a story was unfolding at a church in Leicester which I was told about afterwards.

PART ONE

In the church service there was some quiet time for people to let God talk to them and people were encouraged to close their eyes in case God was giving them a picture. A couple of people came forward and shared what God was saying to/showing them, but one of the elders went out of the church for a couple of minutes.

At the end of the service the elder stepped forward and spoke how God had given him a picture of a man wearing a green top, standing at a bus stop, he was about 60 years old and had a problem with his right ear. The elder went outside to see if there was such a man at any of the nearby bus stops.

COMMENT

On hearing this story what struck me was the faith the elder had, the trust that others had that this picture was from God and the absolute certainty that this was real, and that the man was there at a bus stop – somewhere.

This is the kind of trust, faith and certainty that we as Christians should experience when God is working in and through us. In our search for a minister we should have faith and trust in God, and when we are presented with God's choice for us we will have absolute certainty.

THE TEST

The test for the fellowship when the elder explained what he had

done was how they received what he had to say – whether they believed him and believed it was a picture from God.

The test for each of us as we hear about this is what we think of it – do we accept it, reject it or try to find a worldly explanation for what happened?

PART TWO

Later in the day, on that Sunday, the elder messaged those within his church, as follows –

So I just went to buy some milk, I passed a bus stop on the way. At the bus stop was a man in a green top, he turned 60 yesterday and had tinnitus in his right ear. He no longer has tinnitus and is planning to come to church on Sunday! Isn't Jesus awesome!

I look forward to hearing what happened next
