The other day I had the pleasure of viewing what might have been the first daffodil in Groby to open this year. I'm a member of the Groby Walkers group that meet at the village hall every Thursday morning for about an hour's walk around different paths in Groby. The walk leader promised us a first look at said daffodil which indeed, had just begun to open from being a tight closed green bud, to show its early promise of vivid yellow flower. All its neighbours were still closed with no sign of what they might become.

As a church, having had to close nearly all our 'together' activities, we are beginning to feel more hopeful that we can open and stay open. As a Christian fellowship each one of us will have experienced the past two years in different ways and different challenges. God has been with us, supporting each of us in that mysterious way of His though sometimes hard to see. He has helped us face the challenges of church closures when we couldn't meet, and to be more creative in how we could meet. Sue Lawrence-Brooks and I recently agreed that we felt homegroups are stronger as we have become more reliant on meeting together in smaller groups. As individuals we have perhaps learnt more about Facebook and zoom, but also hopefully about God's care and protection, about His great love for us, about how He gives light and hope. He has given us a Saviour, and so much more. I believe for example, that He has provided the creative intellect that has enabled scientists to find a way out of the pandemic through vaccinations and testing.

As we 'open' up to be seen, what will be seen? Will it be enough for folk to want to take a second, closer look. Will it be loving enough to draw people in - to want to know more?

Closing everything as we had to do, back in March 2020, means that we don't have to open everything now that we can. We can also open in another way and that is a challenge for us, but daunting at the same time. There are many types of daffodils and perhaps not always clear which one you're looking at until more fully open.

So what has God got in store for us in 2022? Perhaps more to the point, what have we got in our store that will help us serve God through this fellowship in 2022?

We pray for new life, that even now, roots continue to grow unseen, but seen by our heavenly Father. We look forward together into 2022, praying that we will become the Christian Community God has in mind.

## Y-Church – Can you help?

It's so exciting to be able to get Y-Church restarted & help our families get back into regular church life. However, we really do need more volunteers to make this happen & allow this provision to continue.

At the moment most of the sessions are being led by parents, with a few other regulars who have volunteered to help support the groups. I am very grateful to those who have already offered their help but we really need more people to step & get involved in leading sessions to ensure they can carry on.

The children have been split into two groups one for primary school age & one for secondary school age. Each group needs someone to lead the session & then we also need to have a third person out to assist with the younger group, this is to ensure that safeguarding requirements are met.

We really need people to help lead both groups, resources & even lesson plans can be provided for anyone who wants to help & I'm happy to talk through how the sessions work with you. The rota is on the notice board at the back of church if you are interested in putting your name.

I would encourage everyone to think & pray about whether they would be able to help with this provision. Even if you just give it a go for one session, that's one session our parents can take part in a full service & you never know, you just might like it enough to do another one! Without Y-Church it is very difficult for families to come to church & whilst it is currently parents getting these groups up & running again, I feel that it is the responsibility of the whole church to ensure that our children are well looked after & set up with the tools they need to live a life for Christ.

Ultimately, we pride ourselves in being a family friendly church, however, if we cannot offer this resource then we have to ask ourselves if this is really the case.

# tearfund Putting a Lid on Poverty

Given the present Covid situation, we had a gratifying result to our 'Bin-Twinning' Christmas Appeal with a total to date of **£669.** 

This is more than sufficient to twin both the church outside bins and the kitchen bin, with the extra donations going to Tearfund's partners in Uganda to help them raise community awareness about waste on health and the environment.



### A Rubbish Campaign:

Tearfund's Bin Twinning invites people in the UK to 'twin their bin' by donating to help fund a social enterprise in countries like Uganda. In return for a one-off donation of £45, they receive a certificate to stick on their bin to show it is twinned.

Several church members are due to receive certificates for their individual donations for twinning their wheelie bins.

**Thank you** everyone for your splendid response to the appeal.

#### We Can Make a Difference:

Currently there is no waste collection system in Uganda. More that 600 tonnes of plastic are dumped every day. 90% is burnt or sent to land-fill.

With our support, Tearfund's local partners will employ

hundreds of workers to collect plastic and turn it into paving blocks. Wages will be more than twice the local average.

#### Waste Affects us all:

As Christians, we are called to be good stewards of God's creation; so reducing our waste footprint should be part of our response, especially as so much UK plastic ends up abroad.

We hope twinning bins and seeing the Bin Twinning sticker will help people become more mindful of how much waste they generate, as they support innovative start-ups tackling the waste crisis.

## Prayer

As we started worship in this new year on Sunday morning the 2nd January, our elders reminded us that "we are committed to worshiping God and sharing the gospel of the Lord Jesus under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and that we seek to achieve these aims through":

#### Prayer, Teaching, Fellowship and Witness.

Firstly we spent a short time looking at Prayer.....

When we look at prayer through the lens of the scriptures, we could be forgiven for thinking that it's always an individual thing where an individual Christian speaks to God.

However as we see the young church developing in Acts, we see that prayer is not always an individual activity, but can be a very powerful tool for the church "en mass"!

Looking first at Acts ch 2 we see the church receiving the life giving gift of the Holy Spirit and towards the end of the chapter in v42 we read "and they continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doctrine, and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in prayers." So we see THEM, collectively continuing in teaching, fellowship, communion and prayer!

What an example for us!

Then towards the end of ch4 when Peter and John are released after the healing of the crippled man at the temple, v24 "and being let go they went to their own companions and reported all that the chief priests and elders had said to them (v24) So when they heard that,

"they raised there voice to God with one accord and said"

Once again we see the whole group praying!

There is much we could say here about prayer, for instance we could look at the Lord's Prayer as an example of how we should pray, but suffice to say at the start of this new year that we should not underestimate the importance and power of collective prayer.


### **Recommended Reads.**

Hi everyone.

Mary asked me if I could recommend a Christian book I've read recently and I had to confess that I've not read anything new of late that I could recommend - not in an easy read style at any rate.

However, because I had nothing recommended to me during lockdown I decided to re-read some of my old books and I re-read the whole of the Narnia series - and thoroughly enjoyed doing so. C.S.Lewis was a fine laytheologian as well as holding teaching posts in English Literature at both Oxford and Cambridge. If you are ever looking for a basic theological guide to Christianity you won't find better than his Mere Christianity.

However, that's not what I am recommending. He wrote seven fantasy stories about a mythical country called Narnia into which a series of children were transported and had adventures. Nearly everyone knows about The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe and the film version is a pretty accurate account of it. It is also a wonderful fantasy retelling of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.



However, I wonder how many people have read all seven of the stories. All of them have a spiritual message (or messages) within them and most of all they are fun to read for all ages.

And if you do read the series (again) make sure you get to The Last Battle the last of the books. Remember it's a fantasy but it will make you think about the end times and what heaven is like. These are topics we don't often address and this book provides a real fun way of getting into the topic.

All 7 books have been bound together, by the way, and available from Amazon and other places at a very reasonable price.

I would also highly recommend two 'not-Christian' books that I have read recently. Bill Gates 'How to avoid a climate disaster' and Barack Obama's 'A Promised Land' - neither are what I would call light reading but extremely interesting for those with particular interests.

# Fairtrade Fortnight 21st February to 6th March Fairtrade Reaction to COP 26.

Although we are not doing anything specific this year, we mark the event by a look at an open letter written by Mary Kinyua who is a Fairtrade flower farmer from Kenya. She is the Fairtrade International board representative to COP26, and represented Fairtrade International on the UK CSO & Youth Advisory Council. The letter is a response to the final communique of the COP 26 summit.

"This COP's outcome is in many ways a cop out, a frustrating conclusion to this summit filled with hope that we would see a start to the healing of our world.

"As farmers ourselves, representing 1.8 million Fairtrade farmers and workers across the world already living with the devastating realities of climate change, we came to Glasgow in good faith, hoping our world leaders would listen to our voices and keep their promises. Our message of ensuring the planet temperature rise remains within 1.5 degrees and that the costs of addressing a changing climate would not be unfairly placed on those of us who did the least to cause it – could not have been clearer.

"It is hard to understand why the prospect of a 2.4 degree temperature rise has not driven world governments to deliver on the promises made in Paris. It is hard to understand why the climate finance promise of \$100 billion per year is still outstanding. It is painful to see that no commitment at all has been made to pay for the unavoidable loss and damage faced by our communities. "Of course we have seen some welcome moves. The speed at which our climate is changing makes it vital that governments will be asked to raise their commitments again in Cairo next year, rather than waiting for another five years. Promises on deforestation are critical for millions like me for whom farming is a way of life, and the announcement of a 'Just Rural Transition Fund' is an encouraging move. The key will be ensuring these new funds are delivered as promised, and that they actually reach farmers and our communities in low-income countries, and reaches them swiftly.

"Fairtrade farmers and citizens of the global Fairtrade movement will not let this stand. We are already working to tackle the climate crisis on the frontline in our communities, with the knowledge and love of the land that we have as farmers. And we know that there are Fairtrade buyers and businesses and supporters who will stand with us, working alongside us day to day to do what we can and calling for action until promises are finally kept. We are doing our part, it's time for the leaders to do theirs."
