This year the United Reformed Church is celebrating its Golden Jubilee.

The Congregational Church of England and Wales and the Presbyterian Church of England joined together in 1972 in the tradition of the Reformation. Groby was inaugurated in October of that year. Today it is a union of three long established churches with the Churches of Christ joining the Union in 1981.

Apparently, the powers that be thought in 1972 that the URC would not reach its Silver Jubilee, let alone Golden! This anniversary offers a chance to focus on all the good in our own story and reflect on what really matters with the community we serve here in Groby. It is interesting to note that Groby church membership for this decade fluctuated between 46-25 and during this era planning permission was granted to erect the new buildings on the condition that the old church was demolished and replaced with a carpark. What faith!

The new church was finally opened and dedicated in May 1982 (40th anniversary this year).

Tuesday 30th at 7 pm: A meeting of all church members from the 5 churches to take place to discuss and seek God's will as to whether Paul is called to be our minister. Venue to be agreed.





Tearfund At the Table of the Powerful

The 'Table of the Powerful' was the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting that took place in Kigali, Rwanda. You may have caught up with it on the news as both our Prime Minister and Prince Charles were also there.

The event brought together leaders of the Commonwealth – a group of 56 countries – to agree on actions to improve the lives of their citizens. It was also an opportunity for local leaders to raise important issues that are affecting their communities – such as the climate crisis.

In 2009, leaders from wealthy countries promised to deliver \$100 billion of support a year from 2020 for countries who were vulnerable to the effects of extreme weather caused by the climate crisis.

However, much of the funding that was promised has yet to be delivered. And much of what has been offered so far has come through loans – adding to the debts of already poor countries. Tearfund supported young Africans to come

to the meeting and speak up about this injustice.

Leading the way

'Wealthy countries must deliver on climate finance,' shares Jessica, one of the activists from Zambia we worked with. 'In Zambia we rely on agriculture and not everyone can afford to use irrigation to help crops grow in tougher weather conditions. This is where climate finance could help.'

'It was great to see young people lead the way,' shares Ben Niblett, from Tearfund's Global Campaigns Team, who was at the meeting. 'We really felt like God was opening doors for us and that our message was being heard by decision-makers. Thank you for your prayers on this.

'One of my favourite moments was when Martha, from Ecobrixs – a local partner in Uganda – stood up at the Commonwealth Women's Forum and took the letter that our young activists had written to bring to the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting. She waved it at the panel, and then – something that no one else this whole week has done – she marched up to the front and gave them each a copy.

'And that's the kind of confidence we need if we're going to represent Jesus at the tables of the powerful.'

- Praise God for the boldness of the young people who came and spoke up for those living in poverty who are affected by the climate crisis. Pray that they will be inspired to continue to challenge the powerful on behalf of their communities.
- Pray that world leaders will honour their commitments and deliver climate finance – and not as a loan – to countries who are suffering from the effects of climate change.



Updates on Ukrainian Families in Leicestershire

In Hinckley

You will know that our friends Malcolm and Jane Clarke are heavily involved in supporting Ukrainian families in Hinckley. Their own daughter in law is Ukrainian and she, along with her husband (Jane & Malcolm's son) and mum, went to Poland earlier this year to assist in bringing them to the UK. There are now quite a few families being hosted by people in Hinckley, and Hinckley Baptist Church has been a focal point for community events and 'get togethers'.

One of these events is HUGS (Hinckley Ukrainian Group Support) which either uses Pathways or the Baptist church. Malcolm says, 'I'm glad that there is a group like ours where the newly arrived refugees can find others with whom they can build friendships, discovering together and with the help of The Borough Council and other agencies, things like: how to get children into school; how to apply for Universal credit:

where the doctors and dentists are; where to plug in to English lessons: and so many other matters. Pray on please'.

English speaking lessons have now begun at Hinckley Baptist, thanks to

Yana who used to provide English lessons in Ukraine before coming to the UK with her two boys.

Malcolm tells us 'Some Ukrainians are having to return to Ukraine, for legal reasons, (eg the signing of legal documents, transferring property etc) or to visit family. They will only be away from here in the short term, and their visas allow for re-entry. But one can only imagine how hard all this might be; how emotionally stressful; how practically painful.'

As Ukraine has now been pushed from the media headlines, Malcolm urges us 'Pray for the hundred and one other issues occupying the headlines by all means. But not at cost of praying too, for the Peace and Welfare of Ukraine'.

When asked how best we can support them as a church, Tom immediately had some suggestions:

- i) our families, with children of their own, might be able to offer playdates.
- ii) others might consider taking the family to local places of interest e.g. Bradgate Park.
- iii) invite the family round to share a simple meal, conversation and fellowship which would also be a great help.

Additional requests are:

- i) bikes for all 3 of them
- ii) a blow up pool
- iii) bedroom storage furniture

Let's do what we can to give practical support and extend the hand of friendship to this family who have lost so much and for whom life will never be the same again.

As a church fellowship, we were able to support 'Bob and Betty' for quite some time with regular donations of basic supplies.


We would like to do the same for this family also and they would be grateful for any of the following items which can be left in the box in the foyer of the church.




