

WELCOME FROM RACHEL CHURCH ELDER



Hello & welcome to our June copy of Contact!

As we come to the end of May the weather finally seems to be improving, the sun is shining (a little bit more often), the birds are singing & the flowers are starting to bloom. Whilst I'm not a natural gardener it's fantastic to see the flowers & plants that I managed to grow starting to come to life & bring some colour & even more nature into the garden!

The wonder of nature never ceases to fascinate me, the fact that a beautiful flower can come from a tiny seed & that flower can be part of a huge habitat that can sustain so many forms of wildlife, which in turn spread the seeds which help create more flowers is truly amazing!

I could spend hours professing the wonders of nature & how it tells of the beauty, power & tenderness of our God, but whilst searching for a topic for this month's welcome this is not what I feel God is wanting me to share (but feel free to spend some time revelling in His goodness in nature anyway!)

When thinking what to write for these letters I find myself often going back & forth over different ideas, rewriting them all several times, before realising that it is God's words, not mine that matter, so finally sitting & listening to what He wants to say. This month this process has constantly led me back to something Paul said at a recent Elders' meeting when talking about our new members. He told us that when someone asks to become a member of a church, he asks them one question; "What do you believe?"

Since then, I have found this question coming to mind frequently – it seems such a simple question, but how would I answer it? It seems to be more challenging than it seems on the surface. To me it can often be difficult to put into words exactly what I believe, it can seem too big to explain without trivialising the importance of my faith, the difference it has made to me & what it could do for someone else.

Earlier today a song I was listening to reminded me of a tradition we had at the church I grew up in, where on the first Sunday of each year we would have a rededication service. As part of this we would all read The Apostle's Creed. Whilst this seems to be largely an Anglican tradition it's something our Baptist church had done for years & as I grew up the importance of the words being read, in unison with other Christians, helped me affirm & then reaffirm what I believed.

I'm sure most of you will have heard the words of the Apostle's Creed before. But if you're not familiar with it here it is:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

I find as I reread these words for the first time in several years it reminds me of the key aspects of my faith – I believe in God as my Father, I believe that His son, Jesus Christ, came to earth, was crucified & rose again, I believe that through him we can all be resurrected & I believe that Jesus left his Holy Spirit on earth to help us all live a life of faith.

Taking the time to dwell on these fundamental truths is not just reaffirming, it's also exciting! It helps me to see glimpses of God at work in my life & it helps me to reconnect with my Father God & to feel Him close to me.

So, I would like to pass Paul's question on each of you & challenge you to spend some time thinking about what it means to you:

"What do you believe?"

Connie's Trip to Israel



At the time of writing, it is just about 7 weeks since I came back from Jerusalem – and that's nearly the same amount of time that I was there for! The time has passed very quickly since I last wrote for Contact and I'm now back at work – coming to terms with the

fact that my day job no longer involves shepherding tour groups from all over the world around a place that may or may not be the site of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection.

Thank you to those of you who were praying for me during my time away. I asked that God would help me to serve with the strength that he provides and speak his words and I believe he answered this prayer abundantly. During my time working at The Garden Tomb, I had the opportunity to guide over 99 groups from at least 21 countries – over 3,135 people, in all weathers (!)



around the site which naturally provides visitors the opportunity to reflect on the cross, and the hope of the resurrection. I was so thankful for the opportunity, for the team around me, for our team leaders and the actual work which I loved. Being away from normal life and responsibilities also allowed me the freedom to 'just' focus on the people and tasks in front of me each day which was also restful in an unusual sort of way. I also enjoyed lots of time for reading, socialising with new friends and a bit of sightseeing.



One of my favourite days was a Sunday when some of the team headed out of the city to have a picnic in the fields. As we drove, the neighbour of one of my co-workers (a Dutch lady trained as a tour guide) casually pointed out the place that (traditionally) David is said to have met Goliath. In this

part of the Judean foothills, surrounded by olive groves, vineyards and almond farms, there are ancient ruins to stumble upon everywhere. Our sights were mostly set on finding a quiet place to eat lunch, however! We observed how vividly green the fields were. It can be surprising to learn that this part of the world is not all desert. Seeing the fields at the end of the rainy season, and this real-life middle eastern shepherd guiding his sheep and keeping them out of the road, helped us to reflect on Psalm 23. This is the place and the picture that David had in mind when he wrote that 'The Lord is my Shepherd, I lack nothing'! I am thankful that during my time away I was able to reflect on God as the Good Shepherd who leads and guides, feeds, protects, keeps and knows his sheep completely. And he had led me to green pastures in every sense.

After one of the best experiences of my life I was very sad to come home (particularly as it took me two attempts to actually leave the country due to the strikes over judicial reform) but I do trust that he will continue to lead and guide me now I'm back and as I consider my future. I would value your continued prayer in this. If you are able, please also pray for the work of the Garden Tomb, and for peace in the whole region which (as you may know from watching the news) is troubled, not only by the impact of the ongoing occupation and conflict but with much upheaval related to

government proposals for judicial reform.

On a regular basis our church receives thank you letters for our regular and faithful financial gifts; they also send periodic updates of how this support helps communities become more sustainable and improves the lives of many people.

Last month we received details of a holistic approach to waste management - you may remember our Bin Twinning Christmas Campaign of December 2021.

The Earth is the Lord's The World and all who live in it (Psalm 89:11)

Thanks to your support, we are helping prevent burning waste.

- With no access to water management, 2 billion people have to dump or burn rubbish.
- Burning waste releases toxic fumes, increasing the risks of heart disease and cancer.

Our support is also helping to improve health, air quality, safety, and education, opening up opportunities for new sources of income, often through church-led self-help groups.


JOINT CHRISTIAN AID WEEK SERVICE 'TAKE AWAY' christian


