We are all made in the image of God and as such we share the need for a sense of belonging and acceptance. How wonderful that we are all able to have these needs met by each other as we continue to walk alongside each other and offer each other support and friendship.

"It's better than being home alone" one lady said. "I've had a wonderful time,"

Next week we will be having fun with the families who come to enjoy our Tasters café on Saturday morning too. This time we will be turning church into the seaside, with a beach, paddling pool, crafts, ice cream and photo opportunities. At the end of August, we will have our second men's breakfast and into September our lady's afternoon tea, and also the start of the Alpha course.

For me this is church at its best. Jesus said that he came not to be served but to serve, and to show us such love that we understood through his actions, the love of the Father. His acceptance of us is un-conditional, there is nothing we can do to make him love us more, and nothing we can do to make him love us less. He came not to condemn, but to woo every person on the earth to himself. It is only as we journey in this sense of belonging and acceptance together as children each made in his image that we begin to fully understand ourselves, our needs, our damaged selves, and our damaged world, through the lens of his love. Brené Brown describes true belonging as "the spiritual practice of believing in and belonging to yourself so deeply that you can share your most authentic self with the world and find sacredness in both being a part of something and standing alone in the world. True belonging doesn't require you to change who you are, it requires you to be who you are."

I interpret this as accepting, the un -conditional love of Christ, by finding strength in him and our community to face the challenges of life together. Being transformed by the Spirit of God at work in all of us as we accept both the light and dark within us, and allow Gods love and teaching to change us to our true authentic selves.

Sam Wells in his book 'Incarnating Ministry; Being with the Church' articulates a theology of "being with" arguing that the heart of Christian faith is God's commitment to "be with," revealed most deeply through Jesus. For Wells, "being with," starts with people's assets, not their deficits, and models enjoying each other for their own sake, not to "do for them", or "to use them."


This is challenging and uncomfortable, but it is a theology being outworked in places like Tasters, Catch, and the numerous activities I have mentioned. A willingness to treat people as valuable in God 's sight, as a people beloved as children of God, as individuals in whom the Spirit of God is already at work, and where it is safe for us all to be our authentic selves. This includes those on the edges, the mentally ill, the cognitively different, and those who strike us as odd.

Maybe this understanding of God is new to you. Perhaps you yourself want to learn more, or perhaps you have people around you, who are curious, and questioning what's happening in the world right now. Why not invite your friends to join you for Alpha? Enjoy the wonderful hospitality we are developing as part of our theology with each other with a two-course meal, and open discussion, and continue the journey into an acceptance and belonging you have perhaps never thought possible but is available in Christ.

Let's learn together.

Here are some of the points that she made.

1. Forgiveness is compulsory for Christians. We forgive because we have been forgiven.

'For if you forgive other people when they sin against you, your Heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins.' Matthew 6:14-15.

2. The unlikeliest people respond to God. Responding to God requires change, repentance and turning away from wrong ways of thinking and acting.

God's view of the world (and its people) is not our view. We need to see the world through God's eyes. For God is loving and compassionate.

SUNDAY MORNING TEACHING AND READINGS FOR SEPTEMBER

Our preaching in recent months has been based on two short books, Jonah and then Philippians. Let's now get our teeth into a whole Gospel, for what is more central to our Biblical faith than the Gospels? Of the four Gospels, the only one not to have been covered in our sermons in the last nine years, and the one least often preached from in the last fourteen years, is Matthew's. I know not why!

But don't worry, the Old Testament will not be ignored! For Matthew quotes the OT more than an other New Testament author. "Fulfilled" is one of Matthew's characteristic verbs, as he makes the connections some of us find so hard between Christ and the OT Scriptures.

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all of God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives - work, family, friends and future - completed in Him.

And by the way, we shall start at chapter 3, leaving the first two chapters of Matthew until Advent: I think you know why! Paul.

At the end of June, it was Oscars all round for *Groby Sings At The Movies*. It was so good to be back at our 'home' in Groby College and to finally have space for all three choirs to come together after several weeks of rehearsing separately at The Groby Club.

It was no mean feat for Musical Director, Simon Lubkowski, who was experiencing his first major Groby Sings concert weekend, to have only one rehearsal in which to blend over 100 voices so that they produced a quality performance in every song. After the concerts, Simon commented to the choir, 'Well done for learning your songs so well.....(and)..... showing the enjoyment of singing together in this wonderful group – the youth choir were amazing and I found myself quite emotional at the quality of both their singing and the potential they have for the future.'

Groby Sings has always played a part in boosting the confidence of our young singers as has been shown by past youth choir members who have gone on to take part in school concerts, the Leics Sing Show Choir, which has performed at the De Montfort Hall and the NEC, and the Schools Prom at the Royal Albert Hall, amongst other events. One young Groby Singer also appeared in a West End stage production.

At the post-concert Celebration Evening, there was a final singing of songs from *Groby Sings At The Movies*. BBC Radio Leicester visited to record interviews and take photographs to publicise our being finalists in the Community Group category for BBC Radio Leicester's Make A Difference Awards 2023. Julian Meetings starting in Groby!

Julian Meetings are ecumenical groups of people who meet together regularly to practise silent, contemplative prayer. At a Julian Meeting we sit in a circle and relax in the presence of God. A short devotional reading leads into a time of silent prayer with a candle in the centre to focus on as we open ourselves to God and wait on Him.

This practise is not something new and has different names in the Christian tradition: The prayer of loving attention; contemplative prayer; the prayer of silence; the prayer of the heart. It is a way to open ourselves up to God free from any agenda we may bring. It is an opportunity to sit in each other's presence and the presence of the divine: we share the silence together.

The meeting in Groby is open to everyone – those of 'all faiths and none'. We will meet on the first Monday of each month at 7:15 with 20-30 minutes of silence beginning around 7:30. The silence will begin and end with a few words or a chime. Some may wish to leave the venue silently, whilst others may want to stay and have a quiet chat.

Our first meeting will take place on Monday September 4th at Groby Library. There is no charge but there will be a tin for donations to cover the cost of hiring the library.
